## Week 3: People of Generosity



We often can sum up any talk on generosity with these three observances:

- give generously and cheerfully,

Read this poem, Written on her <u>Chair's Travels Facebook page</u>, Rachel Parkinson (chair of the Wolverhampton and Shrewsbury Methodist District) said this in a very helpful piece:

I've realised that my knee-jerk reaction to spontaneous generosity is to turn it down. This week I've been practising a different way.

'No thank you' I say to the torch, the blanket the coffee the spare room for a night. 'I don't want to put you to any bother' I say as I think 'This might get awkward' And so I deny myself light, warmth, refreshment, shelter. I deny you the spontaneous joy of gifting. I deny us the adventure of encounter the chance to meet Christ as both host and guest. lust as well that this time I said 'Yes please!'
